
# Lawley & Overdale – 2011 Census Profile



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# 1 Population Characteristics

# **Summary:**


- Lawley & Overdale's population increased by 12.8% between 2001 and 2011.
- In the ten years prior to the 2011 Census, the 0-15 age group decreased from 26.3% to 23.6%, with those aged 16-24 increasing by 15.1%.
- The 25-44 cohort decreased from 37.5% to 35.1%, with the population aged 45 and over increasing; 45-64 by 37.6% and 65+by 28.5%.
- Lawley and Overdale's population is dominated by the 40-44 age group, with higher proportions than Borough wide.

# 2 Diversity

# Summary:

- The BME population of Lawley & Overdale grew by 83.6% between 2001 and 2011, accounting for 11.4% of the ward's total population, slightly higher than Borough wide (10.6%).
- The Asian population has increased by more than a half and at 5.6%, higher than the Borough rate of 4.2%, remains the largest BME group in the ward.
- Although the proportion of Christians decreased from 72.1% to 57.5%, it still remained the largest religious group in the ward, but was below the Borough wide figure (61.7%).
- For the first time in a census, people were asked for their main language. Out of the 3.9% of the population whose main language is not English, the majority can speak English well or very well (3.0% of the population), just below the Borough-wide rate of 3.1%.

# 3 Household and family characteristics

# **Summary:**

- The 2011 Census found 1,969 occupied household spaces in Lawley & Overdale accommodating 5,225 people, an average household size of 2.65.
- Just over a fifth (21.8%) of households in Lawley & Overdale are one person households, lower than the Borough figure of 25.2%.
- The predominant household type in the ward is married couples with dependent children (21.1%), although this household type has decreased since 2001.
- The proportion of households without access to a car or van (14.0%) has fallen since 2001 and is lower than the Borough figure (20.6%).
- A half of all households in Lawley & Overdale (50.3%) were deprived in at least one dimension, compared to the 58.3% seen across Borough.

# 4 Housing

#### **Summary:**

- The number of household spaces in Lawley & Overdale has increased by 185 since 2001 accounting for 5.8% of the 3,181 growth seen Borough wide.
- The largest accommodation type in the ward is detached houses or bungalows (39.4%), above the 30.8% Borough wide.
- Some 48.5% of households own their home with a mortgage or loan, a decrease from 58.9%, but above the Borough wide rate (36.5%).
- The proportion of households renting their home from a landlord or letting agency has nearly tripled since 2001.
- Some 7.9% of households mistakenly believe they rent their home from the Council, a decrease from 10.6% in 2001.

# 5 Employment and economy

## **Summary:**

- Between 2001 and 2011 the economically active population in Lawley & Overdale increased from 76.0% to 77.7%, above the Borough rate of 69.4%.
- The unemployment rate in the ward increased from 3.0% to 4.3% in the decade preceding the census, slightly lower than the Borough rate of 4.7%.
- Some 6.8% of Lawley & Overdale residents aged 16-74 have never worked, slightly below the Borough rate of 7.2%.
- The predominant occupation group in the ward is 'professional occupations' (14.1%) similar proportionally to Borough wide (13.9%).
- More than a quarter (29.5%) of Household Reference Persons in Lawley & Overdale are classed as social grade C1 supervisory, clerical, junior managerial/administrative/professional, slightly higher than Borough wide (28.3%).
- The proportion of residents in employment in the ward who travel to work by driving a car or van has increased from 69.4% in 2001 to 76.1% in 2011, higher than the 70.0% Borough wide.
- A fifth (20.1%) of Lawley & Overdale's residents have no qualifications, lower than the 24.6% Borough wide.

# 6 Health and care

# Summary:

- The large majority (85.5%) of Lawley & Overdale residents reported good or very good health, above the 80.2% Borough wide.
- Some 12.8% of the ward's residents felt their day-to-day activities were limited by a long term health problem or disability, below the Borough wide 18.6%.
- A total of 8.9% of Lawley & Overdale residents provide some level of unpaid care, lower than the Borough figure of 10.8%.

# **Notes and definitions**

#### **Household deprivation**

The 2011 Census categorises households on their deprivation across four dimensions

- Employment Any member of the household aged 16-74 who is not a full-time student is either unemployed or permanently sick
- Education No member of the household aged 16 to pensionable age has at least 5 GCSEs (grade A-C) or equivalent AND no member of the household aged 16-18 is in full-time education
- Health and disability Any member of the household has general health 'not good' in the year before census or has a limiting long term illness
- Housing The household's accommodation is either overcrowded (occupancy indicator is -1 or less) OR is in a shared dwelling OR does not have sole use of bath/shower and toilet OR has no central heating.

# **Household Reference Persons**

HRPs provide an individual person within a household to act as a reference point for producing further derived statistics and for characterising a whole household according to characteristics of the chosen reference person.

- For a person living alone, it follows that this person is the HRP.
- If a household contains only one family, then the HRP is the same as the Family Reference Person (FRP).
- If there is more than one family in a household, the HRP is chosen from among the FRPs using the same criteria used to choose the FRP i.e selected on the basis of their economic activity, in the priority order.
  - Economically active, employed, full-tine, non-student
  - Economically active, employed, full-time student
  - Economically active, employed, part-time, non-student
  - Economically active, employed, part-time, student
  - Economically active, unemployed, non-student
  - Economically active, unemployed, student
  - Economically inactive, retired
  - Economically inactive, other
- If some are all FRPs have the same economic activity, the HRP is the eldest of the FRPs, if some or all are the same age, the HRP us the first of the FRPs from the order in which they were listed on the questionnaire.
- If a household is made up entirely of any combination of ungrouped individuals and other related families, the HRP is chosen from among all people in the household, using the same criteria used to choose between FRPs.
- Students at their non term-time address and short-term migrants cannot be HRP.

## **Dependent children**

A dependent child is a person aged 0-15 in a household (whether or not in a family) or aged 16-18 in full-time education and living in a family with his or her parent(s). It does not include any children who have a spouse, partner or child living in the household.
