Willoe Butler

Willoe was chosen by the NDCS to become an Ambassador for Deaf children and young people with the Youth Advisory Board (YAB) in 2020. Unfortunately, due to Covid, Willoe wasn't able to have the full experience of being part of the team but was still able to make a difference by being part of a campaign to raise awareness of the challenges deaf children and young people are experiencing with face masks in school. This included creating a petition signed by over 50,000 people from the UK. Well done on this great achievement.



High Sheriff of Shropshire Award

Tobey has been chosen to receive a High Sheriff Award in recognition of his contribution to the community. Tobey was nominated because of the positive impact he's had on the life of another young man. Tobey has had a progressive hearing loss since he was young and in 2016, aged 11, was told that he needed cochlear implants to be able to hear in the future. For Tobey, who has a fear of medical procedures, this was an enormous challenge but he eventually had his first cochlear implant in 2017.

In 2019, Tobey was asked if he could offer support to J, a boy who wanted to have cochlear implants but who faced similar fears to Tobey. At this stage, Tobey was facing the difficult prospect of surgery for his second implant and still had the same fears and anxieties as previously. However he put aside his own challenges to meet J and talk to him about the process. He was open about his experiences and talked about how he faced his fears and the benefits that surgery had brought. Talking to Tobey helped J undertake his own CI journey and that October J also underwent the surgery. This surgery has had an immensely positive impact on J's life and without Tobey sharing his own experiences, it may not have happened.

Tobey was nominated by Sarah Court (Teacher of the Deaf) and Dawn Ball (Social Inclusion Facilitator) because he was able to put aside his own fears in order to help another person. Everyone who knows Tobey is extremely proud of him, not only for overcoming his own fears but also for turning his experiences into a positive for someone else.

Alex is currently studying Maths, Physics and Chemistry A Levels in the final year of 6th form at his school. Like all young people, he has had to get to grips with schooling at home. To begin with the experience was rather daunting but he is very self-motivated and soon settled into a well-organised routine.

Alex has missed meeting up with friends during lockdown but has kept in touch with them through on-line gaming, video chats and the occasional local walk. He has also kept fit by cycling - both mountain biking and doing his daily paper round. Alex is part-way through his Gold Duke of Edinburgh award and some of the activities have had to come to a stop. However, he

has been able to carry on with his volunteer work at a local nature reserve and his chosen skill of spoon carving, increasing the household collection of cooking spoons.

Fortunately, Alex has coped well with lockdown, largely due to his positive, 'can-do' and easy-going approach to life. Alex hopes to go on to university to study Engineering, specialising in renewable energy (fingers crossed for good exam results!).

Alfie Rixon

Alf has recently won the West Midlands area Young

Reporter of the Year competition.



Alf sent in a report explaining how he had gone from being mainly in a wheelchair to walking and biking through the lockdown period. He also raised questions regarding how children's treatments and support have been affected by the pandemic.

Alf was diagnosed with osteosarcoma (bone cancer) about three and a half years ago whilst back in the UK from Canada, where he'd been living since he was three. He went through three different kinds of chemotherapy and had his lower left leg amputated in November of 2018. Shortly after this he fell and broke the femur of this leg leaving him bed bound, and then wheelchair bound, for about a year. Over the last year he has had to rebuild his physical strength so that he can learn to walk on a prosthetic and get mobile again. Alf had a number of health issues that he has had to overcome, one of which was a complete loss of the top end (higher pitched sounds) of his hearing.

As a mark of the enormous progress made by Alf over the past twelve months Alf, his sister and dad are going to walk ten miles (from Wem to the top of Grinshill and back) to raise money for Hope House. This is something that was unimaginable to him just a year ago.
