1. What is the scope of the policy/function/practice?

<p>Think about:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Explaining the policy or function to an outsider • What does it include? • What does it not include? • Who is it chiefly aimed at? 	<p>The Transport Act 2000 requires all Highway Authorities to produce a Local Transport Plan (LTP) which sets out a long term Vision, strategy, objectives and action plan for improving and maintaining local transport infrastructure and services. It provides the policy background and plan for how the Council and its partners will ensure that local transport services and infrastructure will improve the quality of life for residents and visitors of Telford & Wrekin.</p> <p>The third Local Transport Plan (LTP3) for Telford and Wrekin is now being prepared and will set out how we plan to manage, maintain and develop the Borough's transport network over the period 2011 to 2026.</p> <p>The LTP will set targets for monitoring progress on delivery. These will include the ten transport National Indicators.</p> <p>This Equality Impact Assessment covers the</p>
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	strategic elements of the LTP. Separate and more detailed Equality Impact Assessments will cover individual policies and practices such as the Rights of Way Improvement Plan and Road Safety Strategy.
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2. What is the purpose of the above?

<p>Think about</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What is it trying to do? • What does it aim to achieve? • Would examples help to explain it? 	<p>The LTP will set out how the Council plans to manage, maintain and develop the Borough's transport network over the period 2011 to 2026. It will seek to demonstrate how transport contributes towards the Telford & Wrekin Vision of 'A successful, prosperous and healthy community which offers a good quality of life for all the people of Telford & Wrekin.' It will include policies to promote walking, cycling, public transport, more efficient use of passenger and freight transport, and policies to maintain transport infrastructure including highways, bridges, footways, cycle ways and bus stops.</p>
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3. Who is defining or has defined the strategy policy / function and who implements it?

Managers/Staff/ elected members/service users? 	<p>The Transport Act 2008 retains the statutory requirement for local highway authorities to produce and review Local Transport Plans and to have regard to Government guidance and policies on the environment. The Department for Transport (DfT) issues Statutory guidance to support local transport authorities in producing LTPs. In the latest guidance, the DfT expects authorities to consider their contribution to national transport goals as over-arching priorities for their LTPs. These goals are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Support economic growth • Reduce carbon emissions • Promote equality of opportunity • Contribute towards better safety, security and health • Improve quality of life and a healthy natural environment <p>The goal to 'promote equality of opportunity' includes the challenge to 'enhance social inclusion by enabling disadvantaged people to connect with employment opportunities, key services, social networks and goods through improving accessibility, availability, affordability and acceptability.'</p>
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	<p>Telford & Wrekin's LTP will be developed having regard to the national guidance, regional policies for transport and local plans, policies and strategies such as the Community Strategy, Local Development Framework Core Strategy, Economic Development Strategy, C&YP Plan etc. Development of the plan will also be informed through analysis of transport issues and problems which includes consultation with transport operators, transport user groups, environmental and equality groups and, in accordance with the requirements of the Local Government and Public Involvement in Health Act 2007, members of the public.</p> <p>This is the third LTP to be produced and in part has evolved from and is built on the previous two Plans.</p> <p>The Transport Policy team leads the development of the LTP in co-ordination with Officers from across the Council, external Partners and Members. A joint LTP/LDF Working Group has been set up consisting of Cabinet Members and senior Officers in order to guide the development of the LTP.</p> <p>The community also have input into the LTP. They were involved in initial consultation where they were able to identify what they see as the priorities. They will also be involved in further consultation once the draft LTP is ready in November/December 2010.</p>

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7. What are the particular issues for the groups below in relation to this policy?

Some of the key issues are tabled below. These are not exhaustive:

Age	<p>Young – can be vulnerable to social exclusion through reliance on public transport, walking and cycling. Personal security and the cost of public transport can be a barrier to transport. Younger people often also wish to access transport during evenings/weekends where availability is less</p> <p>Elderly – also reliant on public transport and can face particular challenges relating to physical access to public transport. Fear of crime can be a barrier to transport.</p>
Disability	<p>Can face particular challenges relating to physical access to public transport. Access to transport information is a potential barrier, restricting, for instance, deaf and visually impaired people’s access to transport services.</p>
Gender/Transgender	<p>Women are likely to be more reliant on public transport</p>

	than men, which can impact on their access to services. Crime and fear of crime can be more of an issue for women.
Racial group	Access to appropriate transport information is needed to ensure all groups are able to use services to full potential. An inability to read/understand timetables, and access information on different transport modes can disadvantage this group. BME groups can be more reliant on public transport than white people.
Religion or belief	Unlikely to be a major specific issue but issues maybe covered in other groups, in particular racial group. Crime or fear of crime may be experienced/perceived.
Sexual orientation	Unlikely to be a major specific issue, although crime and fear of crime could be a factor to prevent people using public transport.
Location/ Urban / Rural	People in rural areas are prone to lower levels of access to public transport. Sparsity of population in the rural area means commercial services are often unviable and therefore any services at all may not exist to reach even essential facilities (healthcare etc.)
Deprivation	Lack of access to the private motor car is a common cause of social exclusion. Cost of transport is an issue for those on low income who tend to be reliant on public transport and walking/cycling.

8. How are you proposing to address the above issues within the policy?

Age	Seek affordable measures to enhance public transport services, including community based services for the elderly and facilitate safe walking/cycling. Also seek measures to reduce the fear of crime
Disability	Seek affordable measures to enhance public transport services, including community based services.
Gender/Transgender	Seek affordable measures to enhance public transport services. Also seek measures to reduce the fear of crime.
Racial group	Seek affordable measures to enhance the availability of appropriately understandable information. Also seek measures to reduce the fear of crime.
Religion or belief	Seek affordable measures to enhance public transport services. Also seek measures to reduce the fear of crime.
Sexual orientation	Seek measures to reduce the fear of crime.
Location/ Urban / Rural	Seek affordable measures to enhance public transport services, including community based services.
Deprivation	Seek measures to make public transport more affordable and facilitate safe walking/cycling
