The Lodge Field



Managing the habitat has enabled the numbers of orchids counted to rise from 19 to over 2000 in 15 years.

The group organises regular work days to maintain the fields. We always welcome new volunteers.

The Lodge Field and The Beeches field and pitmound form part of a 'green corridor' along the north edge of the Ironbridge Gorge World Heritage Site.

Green corridors are environmentally important for all sorts of wildlife. They provide, and link, a wide range of habitats for plants, butterflies, insects and animals, allowing species to migrate and disperse.

They also provide a calm breathing space for local communities.

The fields are managed by Ironbridge Meadows Group (IMG) who look after the reserves in partnership with Telford and Wrekin Council who own the land. The groups hold regular work parties; clearing invasive plants such as brambles, and maintaining suitable habitats for wildflowers, birds, butterflies, dragonflies and amphibians.

Volunteers monitor all these species regularly. We have been pleased in particular by the huge increase in orchid numbers over the years.

Come and join us and get involved in work days, plant and wildlife surveys, photography, organising the annual picnic and various other projects.

Meanwhile, please enjoy the area with respect for all the plants and animals that you may come across here.
