Appendix 1. Newport Town Profile

The profile of this parish involves data from a number of sources including the 2001 and 2011 censuses, Newport Town Plan (2014) and local knowledge.

Physical Characteristics

Newport is a market town located to the north - east of the borough of Telford & Wrekin.

Population

The 2001 census recorded a population of 10,814¹. The 2011 census recorded a population of 11,387 people, an increase of 5.3%. The age profile for Newport is compared to the Borough as a whole in Table 1 below.

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Only 16.6% of the Newport population is below the age of 15 years compared to 19.2% Borough wide, whilst some 26.3% of the Newport population were aged over 60 years compared with 20.5% borough wide.

Newport has a working age (16 – 64) population which account for 64.5% of its population, a similar share of the Borough. The Census also recorded a marginally higher proportion of people between the ages of 20 and 24 years relative to the rest of the borough due, in part, to Newport's proximity to Harper Adams University.

Ethnicity

More than nine out of ten of the parish's recorded population was white (97.6%).

Economics and Employment

The parish varies in its employment structure. The 2011 census recorded the proportion of the adult population economically active (66.3%) as slightly lower than the Borough average (69.5%) due in part to an ageing population and the number of full time students at Harper Adams University.

Education

The population census reflects a highly skilled population in Newport with only 20.6% of the Newport population with no qualifications, compared to the Borough wide average of 25%. Furthermore, 44.4% of the working age population have Level 3 qualification or above (equivalent of A Level), which is higher than the Borough's percentage of 34%.

The need for a car to travel to work is also explained by Table 6 below which shows that a majority (60.6%) of Newport working population travel beyond Newport to work, a distance of 5km and over. This is higher than the percentage for Telford & Wrekin Borough (44.5%) over the same distance. The average distance travelled is 18.6km. Newport also has a good road network (served by the A41 heading north/south and the A518 heading east/west) with Telford, Shrewsbury and Stafford².



Farmland quality




Land to the north of the town and to the west of the A41 has sand and gravel deposits. See Plan 3.


Parts of the centre of the town are prone to flood risk. See Plan 4.




